## THE RABBIT GOES ONLINE

"Don't bid notrump. Don't fail to raise my suit. Leave Blackwood to me ..."

"He knows, Papa," interrupted the Hog. "I told him a hundred times. At least he can no longer missort his cards, revoke and lead out of the wrong hand."

I had logged on just in time to witness the start of the weekly online duplicate organized by the Unicorn. When the Griffins' Club closed its doors a year ago due to the pandemic, several members had turned to online bridge to satisfy their hunger for the cards. Initially, the Hog was not one of them, as he regarded online bridge as a pale substitute for the real thing. But once he discovered that wealthy clients were prepared to pay generously for his services, he became a regular on Bridge Base Online. Tonight he had been hired by an old acquaintance, the Emeritus Professor of Biosophistry, commonly known as the Secretary Bird. Not his favorite partner, but alas, as the Dutch say: the chimney needs to smoke.

Their opponents were an odd combination, too. Themistocles Papadopoulos, a clever but exceedingly vain expert a.k.a. Papa the Greek, was paired with the Rueful Rabbit, perhaps the worst but certainly the luckiest player of all Griffins.

"NS have a game in clubs here," remarked Oscar the Owl, the senior kibitzer of the Griffins' Club, who had found a new career as a BBO commentator. "3NT by N is also on. They may even end up in 6.

"I don't think so," said his co-commentator Walter the Walrus. "Only 26 points between them."

This was the hand they were referring to:

The Hog passed in first seat, and the Rabbit looked at his distributional hand. Just having finished a book on the Losing Trick Count, he counted and recounted his



losers: only five. Something told him a forcing two bid would be overdone, so he opened 1♣. The Secretary Bird butted in with a weak 24 jump overcall and Papa made a negative double. After the Hog had raised to 3♠ the Rabbit went into a deep trance. His first hunch was to bid 4♦. But then he would bypass 3NT and perhaps that was their best spot. Suddenly a bright idea dawned on him. He could show his minor twosuiter by bidding notrump. He had seen experts doing it all the time. And if Papa wanted to be in 3NT he could simply pass. So he triumphantly clicked on 3NT and awaited further developments. Papa was puzzled. Hadn't he forbidden the Rabbit to bid notrump? And how could he ever want to play there? Could the Hog, his archenemy, have psyched? No, that was hardly conceivable at these colours. Minors? Was the idiot trying to show both minors? The Greek didn't have a clue. He decided to do justice to his powerful hand by bidding 4♠, praying the Rabbit would not pass. "A great bid by Papa but how will R.R. take it?", asked

The Rabbit was surprisingly quick in making his next call. It was clear to him that 4♠ was a cue bid and that meant there was a duplication of controls. So he signed off in 5♠. Papa raised to 6♠ and in the final seat the Secretary Bird doubled. The double had no particular significance. It was mere routine to double the Rabbit in a slam, for he rarely made twelve tricks on any given hand, and the sound of a double usually added to his natural confusion.

Papa instantly redoubled and all passed. So this had been the animated auction:

Hoping to get his partner in to give him a diamond ruff, S.B. underled his ace-queen of spades. The Hog inserted the 10 and R.R. ruffed. It was his custom to play quickly to the first trick or two and to meditate later - or not at all. So he promptly cashed the ♣K and played the ◆3 to the ace, but when he subsequently clicked on the ◆7 nothing happened. He noticed that the Hog still hadn't followed on the previous trick. "Did you see it was ruffed?" asked the Hog. The Rabbit shivered when he saw that West indeed had played a club. How humiliating! "Please press the undo button, dear Rabbit, so you can take back your ace." "Most certainly not!" hissed the Secretary Bird. "The laws are there to be observed, not to be flouted, and I would remind you that the rules of BBO state explicitly that an undo is only allowed for a mechanical misclick. Not due to changing your mind; not due to playing too fast; not due to not paying attention. Of course, if you wish, you may call the tournament director. He will repeat what I have just said."

"Come, come, Professor," remonstrated H.H. "Surely you wouldn't wish to take advantage of a trivial lapse by an old friend. Be magnanimous. Show your innate generosity."


"That ace of diamonds has been played," insisted the Secretary Bird implacably. "My trump has won the trick. Please play a card so I can lead to the next trick."

Grudgingly the Hog followed with the ◆2. S.B. continued with the ◆A and R.R., still in shock, ruffed. "If East had the last club there was a legitimate chance of making," Oscar analysed. "In that case declarer can get rid of all his diamond losers by finessing the queen and ruffing two small ones in dummy. The heart finesse will see him home. Of course, as we can see, that doesn't work here."

Meanwhile the Rabbit desperately tried to remember if any trumps were still out. Was there, perhaps, a little one lurking somewhere? He could not be sure. So he played the ♣Q and gained some confidence when he saw West following with the 9. If the ♥K was onside he could see himself going down only one, always a good result in a redoubled contract. S.B. covered the ♥J with the king and relieved R.R. won with dummy's ace.

Now he turned his attention to the diamond suit. He remembered all too well how S.B. had ruffed his ◆A. That meant he could finesse the Hog for the ◆Q. He played the ◆7 from the board, the Hog inserted the 10 and the knave won the trick.

Then he ruffed a diamond in dummy with the ♣A and a spade in hand, leaving this position:



On the ◆K S.B. discarded a heart, so did dummy and the Hog contributed the ◆Q. The Rabbit studied that card suspiciously. Why did the Hog throw the ◆Q under his king? He must want him to believe that his remaining ◆8 was master. He had tricked him this way multiple times. But now the Rabbit was on to him. If that ◆Q was his last diamond, H.H. would not have thrown it. So he continued by cashing the ♣J.



S.B. could not afford to discard the ♠Q and shed another heart. Not expecting that the Hog would throw away the ♠Q, R.R. ditched the ♠J from dummy. How the Hog hated online bridge. At a real table he would have found a way to keep a stopper in both red suits. Here he was defenseless and reluctantly he parted with the ♥6. To speed things up the Rabbit was ready to claim his eleven tricks but he could not find the appropriate button. So instead he played the ♥3 to the queen followed by the ♥8. To his astonishment he saw "12 tricks made, +1380" pop up on his screen.

"What happened?" he wrote in the chat.


"He pulled off a perfect double squeeze," Walter the Walrus observed.

Oscar the Owl had the final word: "Curious hand. If declarer fails to unblock the \( \ldot A \), the contract can no longer be made."

### Note

The text is a tribute to Victor Mollo, which sounds so much better than calling it sheer plagiarism (several sentences were literally copied from Mollo's brilliant books).

The board is from round 3 of the Alt Newco 4 (repeated for convenience):



Across the field twelve declarers made 6♣, most of them with some help from the opponents, and ten went down. One of the successful declarers was Simon the Swede (team Black):



West led the ♠2. Declarer ruffed the 10 and advanced the ♥J, covered by the king and the ace. Hult reentered his hand with a club and played a small

diamond. David Chechelashvili (Amateurs) did not want to ruff air and pitched a spade. After winning the ◆A declarer ruffed a spade and drew two more rounds of trumps, ending in dummy. Then he finessed in diamonds, playing the jack when East inserted the 10. He had reached this ending:



The Swede crossed to the ♥Q and ruffed a spade, stripping East of his majors. Then he exited with the ♦6. Jiang Gu was endplayed. He won with the 9 and had to play into South's diamond tenace.

It was a great though not flawless play by Simon Hult. East was helpless. Had he discarded a second diamond earlier, declarer would have simply played ◆K and a diamond in the given ending. However, West could have defeated the contract by ruffing the diamond at trick 4, even if declarer then had thought of unblocking the ◆A. Because of the premature heart finesse a subsequent heart return by West kills the impending double squeeze.

This defense (with the difference that declarer tried to cash the ◆A after the heart finesse) was found by Joe Grue (Donner) and Georgi Matushko (Bridgescanner). Jolly good, chaps!

The New Kid On The Block

**T**he Editor's instructions were 'concentrate on the thought process' - he omitted to clarify if that should be the author's or the players', but nevertheless, here are some deals from the latest ALT:

Round 1, Board 4. Dealer West. All Vul.



This looks straightforward - EW should reach 4♥ or 3NT. However, would everyone score the requisite number of tricks for game?



North led the ◆K and declarer won with the ace and cashed the ♥AK, North discarding the ♦8. Declarer took three rounds of spades, pitching a diamond and then played the ♥10 for the jack and gueen and a club for the jack and ace. South cashed the ♥A and exited with a diamond and declarer could not avoid the loss of four tricks.

16+; 2♦ 8-10 balanced; 2♥ 5+♥; 3♣ 3♥

Suppose declarer ducks the first diamond, wins the second one and then cashes two top trumps, getting the bad news. Three rounds of spades allow a diamond to be discarded and declarer can then ruff a diamond. It might now appear tempting to cash the ♥Q and exit with a heart, forcing South to open up the clubs, but South exits with the ♣2 and if declarer follows with the seven North plays the eight and declarer must lose two clubs. The answer is for declarer to play a club from hand - let's say it's the ten covered by the queen, king and ace. South exits with the VJ but declarer wins, crosses to dummy with the ♣J and plays a spade, scoring the ♥7 en passant. Almost everyone made 4♥ by playing along these lines, but seven players failed to get home.

One further point of general interest: where West opens 1♥ it should become possible to place North with a 4-1-4-4 pattern as the play develops. Assuming North has suggested holding the ◆KQJ then the ♣A is likely to be with South, as Holding it North might have doubled 1♥.

It's worth noting that East did not bother to look for a 5-3 major suit fit.

North led the ♦Q and continued the suit, declarer taking the third round and cashing the ♥AK. He then played the ♠10 to dummy's king and the ♥10 covered by the jack and queen, putting South on play with a heart. His club exit went to dummy's jack and declarer came to hand with the A and played a club. North had pitched two clubs so his gueen was covered by the king and ace and declarer took the last two tricks for +600 and 12 IMPs. Sixteen pairs opted for the nine trick game, only two failing to score nine tricks.

On this deal EW have a decent play for 6♣, which needs the spade suit to behave. (If clubs were 3-0 in certain circumstances declarer would have to make a decision about which card to play from hand on the second round of spades.) However, before the opening lead is made the gods have placed the bidding and it was open to question as to what East would do as dealer.

Two players opted for a Weak Two in spades. Two more used it to show spades and a minor, while there were two who opted for pass and single votes for 2♦ and 1♣. Eight players opted for 4♠, the remaining eighteen starting with 1♠. Declarer had no trouble arriving at ten tricks, +170.



There is an old Russian (and Dutch) proverb that goes, 'Having said A you have to say B'. Having opened East was not afraid to show his playing strength. North led the ♥4 so declarer had some slight additional chances before eventually getting up to 12 tricks with the help of the spade suit, +920 and 13 IMPs.

Sixteen pairs bid a club slam - two of them were overboard in 7♣.

Round 3



EW are likely to play in 5♣, but NS might try 5♥ - cheap enough if they escape a double.

North led the \$2 and dummy's heart went away. Declarer subsequently played for the diamonds to be 2-2, +920. Easy for us armchair critics to suggest that North might have led the \$A, but that might be the waste of a vital tempo. It was the lead made at three other tables against 6\$\Delta\$.

North led the ♥A and continued with the king, declarer ruffing with the ♣K and playing a club to the five, eight and ace. When North played the ♥Q declarer ruffed in hand with the ♣Q pitching a diamond from dummy, cashed the ♠A, went to dummy with the ♣ and played a diamond to the king, claiming when the queen appeared, +420 but an 11 IMP loss.

One NS pair went on to 5♥, losing -200 for a 5 IMP gain, while four EW pairs played in 5♦, two of them in the match between Bridge42 and Macavity.



The first trick went via the 7 and 6 to declarer's queen; NS play upside-down count. Declarer advanced a club from hand. What card did South play?

Eskes followed suit with the ♣6 in stead of a bourgeois ♣2. We will soon see why.

After winning dummy's ace declarer - Giovanni Donati - continued with ◆5 to the 9 and king. South cashed his two top hearts. Declarer, unaware of the bad break in diamonds, pitched a club and all of a sudden 3NT was on fire.


South exited with the ♣10: queen and king. Donati cashed his ♣J and Eskes duly unblocked ♣9. This led to an endgame in diamonds where North - Gé Sprinkhuizen - was good for another two diamond tricks; 3NT down one.

Approximately half of the field bid 3NT, always made. Most of the times declarer played a heart at trick two and the contract played itself.

Great defense by Onno Eskes, a former captain of the Dutch Open Team and nowadays the key IT person of Bridge72, the company that runs the bidding app bid72. Gé was quite impressed by his partner's efforts and therefore nominates Onno for the *ALT Master Point Press Award* for best defended hand.

### Post Mortem

And what if Donati pitched a diamond instead of a club on the second heart? After the ♣10, declarer could work his way to this position:



Declarer, who lost a diamond and two hearts so far, simply tables ♦6; thus scoring six clubs, a spade and two diamonds.

### A SPOILED BRILLIANCY

Toine van Hoof

"From time to time, sitting at the bridge table, you will get the opportunity to rise to the occasion. This does not always succeed because there is also a partner who must understand what is going on." This is how Gabriel Chagas introduced his winning tip of the 1990 Bols Bridge Tips Competition: 'Don't spoil your partner's brilliancy'. It's easier said than done, as demonstrated by this board from round 8.

The player who rose to the occasion was South, Morten Bilde. First he opened his ten count and then he came up with a shrewd defense against 3NT. His partner led the ♣7. Bilde won with the ace, then cashed the ♥K, showing no signs of surprise when it held, and continued with the ♥3. Steve Green was taken in. He put up the queen and saw North produce the ace. The scene was set for down one but after a few agonizing moments Vinita Gupta returned the ♣8. upon which declarer quickly claimed his nine tricks.

In defense of Gupta it can be said that she probably ruled out the possibility of South having a four-card heart suit. So for Bilde to earn the Master Point Press Alt Best Defended Hand, next time he also needs to bid 2.

In the replay West opened 2NT and East raised to 3NT. North led a spade to the king. Declarer crossed to the ◆K and played a club. South rose with the ace and returned a spade for a push.

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






### **Lessons and Curiosities**

by Martin Cantor



My first hand has some learning points on bidding, signaling and defense.

Most players these days are happy to open 1NT with a 22(45) shape provided it is within their agreed range. and it was a popular choice for East here. Somewhat curiously, it was variously described as 12-14, 14-16, 14-17, 14+-17 and 15-17. It seems that notrump valuation, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder. I have no problem with regular upgrades of 14 counts to 14+ or 15, but the hand has to justify it; for me this East hand is not close. Yes, there is a five-card suit, but against that are the lack of intermediates and the uncertain value of the major suit jacks. If you don't like to open and rebid in clubs on this, then you have to agree that a 1♦ opening followed by a 2♣ rebid can be 5-4 either way. Where East opened in notrump North was silenced, but if East opens a suit then North can get the spades in at the one level.

Which brings us to the defense against 3NT. If North is on lead a small spade is normal with no outside entry, and unless declarer has second sight to try the backwards finesse in clubs the contract should go

down. If South is on lead with North silent the choice seems to lie between a spade and a diamond. A diamond is won in dummy and a club (or possibly a heart) finessed. Let's say the ♣9 is played, covered by the 10 and you win the gueen. Is the \$10 a Smith signal (presuming you play them)? With the \$87 hidden you can't be sure, but even if it is a negative, can you find the spade switch? And if you play standard Smith, is it a positive? If declarer tries a heart instead, the reverse Smith 6 is probably but not certainly a high = negative, just as a standard Smith 4 is probably but not certainly a low = negative. Moving on, you are now South on lead at trick three, having won one of your queens, and you are, of course, good enough to find a spade switch. Which spade will you play? For most the system card is the 5, but for Polish-style strict seconds it is the 7. Partner wins the king and cashes the ace, the jack coming from declarer. Are you awake? (It is only the second board of the day, and if you're in the States it is still morning, early morning for some). Your ♠10 is high and you need to ditch it under the ace, perhaps not so hard with that jack staring you in the face.


One last set of what-ifs against 3NT. Suppose it is played by West, and suppose your partner sitting North finds an inspired top spade lead. You will play whichever of the 5 or 7 is your system card to show whatever your agreement demands, namely length or attitude. If partner now continues with the other top honor, are you ready to click on your 10? You'd better be. And if you do you'd better hope that partner has noticed that the 8 is now high.

One further issue remains to be considered. North having bid spades the opponents have avoided 3NT and are in 4, let's say by West, though the issue is much the same if played by East. North cashes the

two top spades, gets your signal, and switches (as they all did at the tables) to the ◆J. Declarer wins in hand and finesses the ♥J to your queen; what are you going to return? At most tables South returned a diamond. That would be a winning move if the ◆J was singleton or from J9, but with three tricks in the bag and a well placed ♣Q I'd have thought that sending a trump back looked a better option.

### Lesson on endplays

My next hand is a poster hand for a lesson on endplays.




About one-third of the field played in 3NT, which is pretty straightforward, but the remainder played in 4. nearly always by East. With a certain loser in each red suit you have to avoid two club losers. Simple souls might bank on the finesse, but not these players, who could see a classic position in clubs. They would win an opening spade lead, or the second trick if diamonds were led and continued, the plan being to take the two top trumps, eliminate diamonds and spades, then exit in trumps. If South has the third heart s/he is endplayed, and if North has the trump you cover whichever club s/he plays, intending to 'quess' right if necessary when another club comes back. So, a nice object lesson in endplaying South. North, however, was not willing to cooperate in your plan, and spoiled it by playing the  $\clubsuit$ 2 when in with the  $\spadesuit$ A.

Almost universally our heroes and heroines were not put out by this; they simply switched the endplay onto North. They took the A, two top trumps, the remaining diamonds and spades, and exited with a trump. Once again, had South had that card, s/he was endplayed to give a ruff and discard or play a club for declarer. When North had the trump s/he had to give the ruff and discard. Experts hate finesses, and this deal is a good example of why they are right to do so.

Bidding and declarer play next:





We can all see that North can make thirteen tricks in notrump, diamonds or hearts, and that South can make thirteen in notrump, twelve in the red suits. I bet you haven't spotted that either of North or South can make game in spades on a 4-1 fit with a 7-1 break against them. I mention this last point, not just as an amusing curiosity, but also because two Easts overcalled 2♠ and played there doubled, one going for 800 and the other for 1100. While we're on the subject of oddities, as part of a relay sequence Mikael Rimstedt in South bid 3♣ to show four hearts, West doubled and Ola Rimstedt redoubled to show a willingness to play there. Which Mikael did, making an overtrick and scoring 840, but losing 5 IMPs to the 6NT+1 in the

other room. A sort of suicide stripe-tailed ape redouble. Another curiosity was that, while no one tried the small slam in hearts, two Souths tried the grand slam in that denomination, were Lightner doubled and went off.


A large majority played sensibly in a small slam, though not all of them quite so sensibly: two played it in clubs, which wasn't a success; and one played it in spades, after a cue bid was misunderstood; definitely not a success. All the 6NT contracts made, but, to my surprise, only one of the six 6 declarers succeeded.

And this is where the lesson is in this deal. Every West led their singleton spade against 6♦. Easts apparently eschewing a Lightner double. The successful declarer won in hand perforce, led a heart to the ace and ran the ten of diamonds. When that held he tried to come back to hand to draw trumps by ruffing a spade with the ♦5, to be overruffed with the 6, but at least he made the rest when West didn't find the club for partner to ruff - for which East is somewhat to blame; having followed to the first spade with the 7, the 2 as suit preference on the second round looks more helpful than the 5. The other five Souths won the ♠A and tried a diamond to the 10, taken by East's gueen. And when another spade came back they either discarded their ♣9, or ruffed with the ♦5, either way losing to West who could now play a club for partner to ruff and a two trick defeat. I don't think that a diamond to the 10 is a bad move, but you might reasonably be very suspicious of this defense and ruff high (as might the successful declarer have done). It is certainly not right to discard the club on a second spade; that can wait. Whenever a player ruffed small to be overruffed my father would say, in an unconsciously mildly sexist or possibly ageist way, 'never send a boy to do a man's job'. However politically incorrect, it is a lesson these declarers would have done well to heed. And ves. I know, a priori 5-1 diamonds is more likely than 7-1 spades, but I also think the play to date tips the odds.

My last two boards are both big shapely and competitive ones, so it's all about judgment and a degree of courage.

On this first one an impressive twenty-one of thirty-four bid up to 7♥, though two of them were outbid by their opponents sacrificing in 7♠. When South opens 1♥ and West overcalls 1♠ North has a monster of a hand. Several just took the bull by the horns and went straight to 4♠ Exclusion Keycard, bidding the grand as soon as they heard of the VAKQ. That seems to me a pretty good estimation of the power of the hand. East now has to decide whether this sequence shows confidence or is a pure punt. If the former it could encourage East to sacrifice, if the latter to pass. I rather think I'd believe the opponents on that auction. Meanwhile, South may have been worried with so many of the values in spades, but dummy proved to be a reassuring sight. Since I've mentioned oddities, here's another. Two pairs stopped short in 5♥. The real oddity: both in the same match, so no swing.




Talking of outré contracts, how about the 3NT by South at one table where North asked partner for a spade stop. EW contented themselves with seven tricks when they omitted to play a spade through the alleged stopper. North bidding 3♠ to ask for a spade stop might seem reasonable, but when I tell you that East doubled 3♠ with an alert 'don't want a spade lead' my lack of a diamond holding might persuade me to look at other contracts. North and East and West all have plenty to say in any sensible auction, but South will only bid if forced to, which makes it tough for North if EW bid up to the five level, as many did. Those who took their fate into their own hands and bid 6♣ then had the unenviable task of finding the ♥Q. Most of them did, earning my respect - though where West had shown spades and diamonds this gave a useful clue. Respect also to Gower-Apteker who 'sacrificed' in 5♦, got doubled, redoubled it, and then on a trump lead scored an overtrick for 1400.

So what is the lesson in all this? It is not a new one: it is good to overcall if you possibly can. Most of the EW pairs finding the save were those where East showed the diamonds early on. Where East stayed silent West generally remained unaware of the double fit, and let the opponents do their thing.


