



As the nights draw in and the sun spends less time on view in the northern hemisphere it seems only fair to try and keep the reader entertained as we delve into the first six rounds of the ALT Trophy.

West led the ◆K and continued with the six, East taking the ace and switching to the ♣Q. Declarer won with the ace and played the ♠6, West taking the queen and cashing the ♣K, -100.

East has plenty of alternatives over North's double; apart from his actual choice you can also use a

redouble to show a high club honor (useful when you have a modest hand but want to try and help partner with the lead) or bid 2◆, showing that suit and tolerance for clubs.

East led the ♣Q and declarer took the ace and fell back on a strategy that was championed by (amongst others) Maurice Harrison-Gray, that of running his long suit. Six rounds of hearts saw West come down to ♠Q3 ♠KQ8 ♣K9 and when she parted with the ♣9 declarer could play a club, establishing the ♣J as his tenth trick, +620 and 12 IMPs.

North led the ◆A and continued with the five, ruffed and overruffed. Declarer cashed the major suit aces then played the ♥Q and North won and exited with a diamond allowing declarer to get two discards, -100.

North led the ♠J and declarer won with the ace and played six rounds of clubs. When South was down to ♠9653 ♥J109 she could see ♠KQ108 ♠KQ left in dummy. When she pitched a heart, declarer exited with the ♦10 and North won and exited with the ♥5 (if South had held on to three hearts that would be one way to defeat 6♣) but declarer had the rest, +620 and 12 IMPs - it was the only positive score for EW.


Round 4

On Board 8 East was looking at

♦9 ♥A32 ♦KJ10763 ♣865

and after a pass by West and 1♣ from North East frequently came into the auction, by overcalling 2♦ or 3♦. This was the full deal:

Board 8. Dealer West. None Vul.



Overcalling 2 \(\structure{3} \rightarrow \) saw South pass and North's reopening double gave NS the opportunity to inflict a substantial penalty. If South starts with two rounds of clubs North wins and cashes a third club on which South discards a spade. Now a diamond switch sees South win and exit with a heart, declarer winning with the ace and playing a spade. South hops up with the ace and continues with a heart, North playing three more rounds of the suit, ruffed by declarer and overruffed by South who exits with a spade to ensure two more trump tricks and -1400. The key point is that South must pitch a spade at trick three, as opposed to a heart. In that case declarer can save a trick by playing back a heart immediately. If North plays three rounds of hearts East ruffs high and whatever South does declarer should score four tricks. As you might expect, the penalties ranged from -500 to -1400.

Having said 'A' by doubling 1♠ North did not say 'B' by doubling 1♠. With best defense that will cost -1100. West led the ♠4 and declarer won with the ten and played a heart to the five, queen and three, followed by a spade to the ace and second heart, East taking dummy's king with the ace and exiting with the ♠J. Declarer won with the queen and played another heart, finishing with ten tricks, +430.

North led the ♦5 for the ten and gueen and South switched to the ♥7 for the ten, queen and ace. When declarer played the ♣5 South went up with the ace and returned the four, North winning with the jack, cashing the king and then playing the three, ruffed and overruffed by South who exited with a heart. North took dummy's jack with the king and continued with the nine. If South discards on that the defenders are on track for six down, but South ruffed, which should have cost a trick. However, declarer got the ending wrong - down to ♠K65, South having ruffed a fourth heart at trick ten with the ♠A and played the ♦8 declarer elected to ruff high rather than low and that meant -300 - still good for 3 IMPs.

South's third in hand opening led to a spirited auction. 4♠ may appear dodgy, but if declarer reads the trump position, starting with a spade to the nine will result in ten tricks being made.

North led the ♦K and continued with the three, declarer ruffing, cashing the A and exiting with the two. North won and played the ♦Q and declarer let that hold, discarding a club. The next diamond was ruffed in turn by the six, eight and jack of hearts and the ♣9 was ruffed by the ♥Q and overruffed by dummy's ace. Declarer now had a high cross-ruff for two down, -500.

Had East passed over 5♣, he would probably have been writing down +750 on his side of the scorecard.








Dear Jan [van Cleeff],

I am one of the contributors to a Polish quarterly bridge magazine *Swiat Brydza* (The World of Bridge)*. I often refer to very interesting hands from your Alt event articles in The Bulletin. The articles contain great comments on the deals they describe and conclusions that many an experienced bridge player would not have reached.

I really liked your article entitled "Steal Of The Year" in the September issue from The Bulletin Alt NewCo 8 (p. 5). I'd like to share my observations on one of the plays in the featured hand - the one by the Great Mahmood Zia - in which North failed to spot a chance to defeat the heart game. Your description was as follows:

Round 3. Board 12. Dealer West. North-South vulnerable.




"Zia Mahmood also played 4♥ and again North kicked off with the ♣9; jack, queen and ace. Declarer cashed his three spades honors and pitched a diamond from dummy. At this point Zia played a diamond from the hand...

At the table South won the king and returned a trump, ducked. Zia won the next trump, crossed to dummy with the ♣K and called for the ♣4. South did not

cover. Zia pitched a spade and claimed ten tricks. ..".

By ducking the first trump trick, Zia probably wanted to keep trump control. But North could overtake partner's heart honor with ♥K in this trick(!). He would then have followed with ♠J, forcing declarer to ruff with dummy's trump. South would have overruffed with his remaining heart honor and played the ♠A, forcing Zia to ruff with dummy's penultimate trump. Here is the ending where declarer has to play from dummy:



Now declarer cannot safely exit from dummy and the defense will score the setting trick with ♥8. For the lost trump trick, the defenders gained two other trump tricks: the overruff and the ♥8 for one down. Such defense could, in my opinion, be nominated for the 2021 Alt Master Point Press Best Defense Award.

Many of my team had only limited availability for the Alt Trophy, so I had to throw myself into the fray again for a couple of matches, and Peter Lund was kind enough to agree to partner me again. For the first six boards I didn't have much to do other than bid like a sensible human being, and then follow suit or watch Peter make his contracts. I knew board 2 might be good for us, when opponents had gone down in a makeable 3NT. So far so good. Peter might not be so kind in the future after seeing how I butchered this deal.

The auction went as you might expect, and I found myself declaring the spade game on the lead of the ♥4. It didn't take me long to see that I had two aces to lose off the top and at least one trump loser (good aren't I?). The third heart could be discarded on a club, or ruffed; alternatively, I could make dummy the master hand and play to set the clubs up. So what might cause me problems? The trumps, and the danger of losing control if they broke badly and my heart stoppers had gone. Or a diamond ruff. The auction made it highly likely that LHO had the missing aces, and quite possibly the ♠K too. I decided to take the first trick in hand and play a club towards dummy, for a number of reasons. It would establish a discard for a heart, it would open communications, but mostly

because, if the ace were ducked, I could afford two trump losers. And if LHO took the ace, the less favored line of setting up clubs would become a more realistic option. It proved to be a good decision when the •K scored. So now I turned my attention to trumps, needing to limit my losers to two, while setting up diamonds without suffering a ruff. Trumps 3-2 would be no problem, so what about 4-1 breaks? Either opponent could have the singleton, and the king could be with either opponent.

Temped as I was to play a small spade off dummy, I couldn't bear the thought of losing to a kingleton in North, so laid down the ace. North's 10 was ominous, but since it could be from K 10, or K 10 9, or 10 9 (8) I now made the fatal mistake of playing a second trump. I should have followed the general rule of setting up my side suit of diamonds first. The winning defense now is for South to win the second spade and play another round of trumps, but when South ducked, and my gueen won, I had a second chance. In the event, a second chance to go wrong. Not immediately. My diamond to dummy's king was fine (taking the ace would not help the defense), and cashing the ♥K was also fine. But my next move of a second diamond from dummy was the opposite of fine. What I needed to do was to start ruffing clubs, which would eventually give me a trick with the queen of that suit. I have to admit that I didn't even consider that (not so good, am I?).

North took his ace and played the boss heart, which I had to ruff in dummy, and when I played dummy's final spade South could take the king, and play a club. If I ruffed it would be my last trick for two down, so I let North have his ace, ruffed the heart, South ruffed a diamond and had to give me the &Q for my ninth trick.

Not an easy hand, but I'm disappointed with myself for not getting it right, unlike the majority. Luckily for us, my West counterpart in the other room was not one of that majority, so no swing. Steve Root of team Harris was the only North to find an opening lead that beats 4♠ legitimately, to wit the beer card ◆7, the defense there scoring two aces, the ♠K and two diamond ruffs.

At this point we led by 14-8, then on board 8 I scraped a second overtrick when cold for ten tricks in 3NT, gaining an IMP, and on 9 our opponents stopped in 2♥ when game makes, which our teammates duly bid in the other room, for 7 IMPs. On 10 it was our teammates who managed an extra overtrick in a cold 3NT, for another IMP, but on 11 our opponents in the other room turned the extra overtrick tables on us, 1 IMP to them. Of course we didn't know the score at any point, so from my point of view it looked like the match could depend on what had happened at the other table on 7. Unless something good or bad happened on the final board. On which, as dealer, with only the opponents vulnerable, you pick up:

♦ J 10 9 2 ♥ A J 5 **♦** J 9 7 4 **♣** A 4

Do you open this hand? If you're playing Precision or Polish or the like where bids are limited, then it is routine, especially at the position and vulnerability. If playing a more standard system, it's more a matter of style and approach.


My teammate Thomas Berg and I discussed it after the match. He said anyone opening this was asking for trouble, 11 HCP and nine losers. It's true that J 10 9 2 counts as three losers, but it's obviously a much better holding than 5 4 3 2, which is also three losers. So, as I told Thomas, I did open it 1♦, for two reasons apart from the seat and colors. Firstly I liked the spade cards. Secondly I would have a comfortable rebid over anything partner might say, raising one of either major to two, and over 2♣ having a choice of 2♦ or 2NT. It is always important to think about your possible rebids before you open, but it is particularly important with marginal openings. Which reminds me of a Victor Mollo anecdote, recounted I think in his Streamlined Bidding. He opened 1♣ and the lady on his left asked him whether this bid was prepared. "Madam", he replied, "all my bids are prepared". Anyway, I did open it, Peter responded one spade, I raised to two, and after some thought Peter bid game.

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

As you can see, Peter had something to spare for his raise to game, and was obviously considering making a move towards slam. One way to do that would be to make what is initially a game-try bid. If partner accepts by jumping to game, you can make a further move since s/he is non-minimum for their minimum initial rebid. If s/he signs off at the three level, you can bid game and you have made a mild slam try. And if s/he makes a return trial bid, you can give it some more thought. The problem that Peter had was that we play short suit trial bids, and his shortage was in the four+ suit that I had opened, and it doesn't make sense to play that as a short suit trial. He might have fudged a 3♣ trial, but I'd have declined and we'd have ended in the same place. Or he might have bid 2NT (if that is forcing).

By now you may be wondering why I have given this so much attention. Partly to introduce this point about trial bids as mild slam tries, which most of you of course know already. But mostly because Thomas's comment had me wondering. So I checked what happened around the tables. Six Wests passed as dealer. The other fourteen opened, of whom two were playing Polish Club, and one opened a mini notrump. The other eleven opened one of a minor. Four pairs got to slam, one after West passed, three after West opened one of a minor. So it seems that players are a little more wary these days of their partners' opening bids. We should note in passing that it is by no means a terrible slam. Put either of the key finesses onside and you have fair chances if the breaks aren't too awful. I've been in worse - and made some of them. Then again I've also been in better, and gone off in some of those. One of the slam bidders was our opponent (this presumably prompted Thomas's thinking), so in the end we had a nice 34-9 (16.55-3.45) win.



North and East will have 'picked up' their hands on this board and remained completely unexcited. South will have felt a small frisson, while West will have sat up and perked up. West might, however, have regretted being the dealer, since it's not clear what or even whether to open this kind of hand, which is often much better described by some sort of overcall later in the auction. But dealer they all were, and I can tell you what they all did. Fourteen passed, biding their time. Four chose to show a weak two-suiter; two went for a weak or weakish two in spades; and there were single votes for each of 1♠ and 4♠.

There is of course no right answer on hands like this, and the results on one board don't give you any meaningful pointers to future deals. Before we see who made (or didn't make) what, let's take a look at who can (in theory) make what. South can make game in clubs, but an opening heart lead and ruff holds North to ten tricks. NS can make nine tricks in hearts, while EW can make nine in either pointed suit. Which means the par contract is 5•X by EW minus 2 for 500 to NS.

The only pair to play in the par contract were Maria Genn & Vladislav Todikov of Juniors+. However, and unsurprisingly, many pairs beat par. Eleven NS played 4♥, three times doubled, going severally one, two or three light, for anything from 100 to 800. Five EW played 4♠, always doubled, always one down, for 200. And there were five individualists: a 3♠ by West, making; a 3♥X by South, one off; a 3NT by South, making an overtrick; a 5♣X by South, one off; and a 6♣ by South, two off.

Altogether, a real hotch-potch of contracts, 86 IMPs swung across eleven tables, which only tells us that freak hands make for freak results. Finally, I should point out that making 5♣ by South is far from trivial; in fact it is pretty double dummy unless West has shown the heart void in the auction. Essentially it requires you to lead the heart eight or seven early on from dummy when there with the trump king.



After the 1♦ opener by Alon Apteker, the two-suited overcall by Ronald Haring and the raise to 3♦ by Peter Fredin, Tom made a voluntary 3♥ bid. That would have been the end of it but for some reason South bid 4. When this came round Tom bid one more heart for the road. He was rewarded with a perfect dummy. South led the ♥10. Tom drew the trumps and advanced the ♠10, covered by the queen and the ace. A spade to the 8 was won with the king by South, who desperately returned a small club. Now declarer could pitch his diamonds on dummy's spades and made an overtrick: plus 450.

Bas ruffed, cashed the A and played a heart to East's king. He ruffed the club continuation, took the diamond finesse, ruffed dummy's last club, played a diamond to the ace, exited with the 8 and claimed.




The bidding at the other table was more peaceful. Bob did not open the East hand and refrained from making a slam try after Marcel Verhaegen's brave 4♠ bid. That was another plus 620 for Netbridge: 13 IMPs.

At ten tables the bidding was Pass-4♥-All Pass. Every West led a top diamond. Four declarers went down when West shifted to the ♣J. They won in hand and played the ♦Q to the king. West played another club to the ace and when East was able to ruff the ♦J declarer could not avoid the loss of a club. South could have prevailed by knocking out the ♥A in trick 3. To beat 4♥ West must lead a club. If declarer wins in hand and plays a heart to the jack and the ace, East has to return the ♥10 to destroy a vital entry to dummy.

Wednesday: Tommy Garvey

None of the brothers did well on Wednesday. The star of the day was Tommy Garvey of team Moran that had a 58-0 blitz against team Apple. On the five hands Garvey declared in this match, his team gained 49 IMPs. Two boards were apt for publishing.



No less than five declarers went down in 4♠ (two of them for 500) on the lead of the ◆Q and a spade to the king in the second trick.







Mark Moran led the ♥K against Brink's 4♠ contract. Declarer won with the ace and shot back a heart, apparently planning to ruff a heart in dummy and develop a tenth trick in one of the minors. Unable to read the situation Brink went up with the ace and saw East ruff. He could not avoid the loss of a diamond and a club: minus 100.

Hilda Setton led her singleton club. Garvey went up with the ace and drew two rounds of trumps with the king and the ace. He continued with the ♣10 to East's queen, won the heart return with the ace, crossed to the ◆A, ruffed the ♣J and drew the remaining trumps to reach this ending:




Having a blueprint of the lay-out Garvey exited with the ♥9. Setton was allowed to take two heart tricks but then had to lead away from the •Q. A beautiful plus 620, gaining 12 IMPs.

Brink-Drijver used some gadgets that brought them in the excellent club slam. Bas commented that they had made some changes in the follow-up over 2NT; so he was not a hundred percent sure about the six-card heart suit, otherwise he would have bid 4♥ instead of 3NT. His 4♠ was 'last train' and weaker than a 4NT bid would have been. Bas confirmed that he could have had the ♣A instead of the ♠A, but in that case he probably would have responded 5♠ (minimum) to optional Blackwood.

The ◆6 was led to the queen, king and ace. Brink discarded a heart on the ◆J, cashed the ♥A and ruffed a heart, seeing the queen drop. A club to the king was ducked by West but now Brink started cashing his hearts, forcing West to ruff and surrender: NS 920 and 10 IMPs to Apple.

Waseem Naqvi from London, U.K., nominated this hand for the *bid72 Best Bid Alt Hand*.


