# WINNERS OF THE 2021 ALT SEASON WILL CHALLENGE EC QUALIFIER CHAMP SWITZERLAND



**ALT X-hibition**, December 17 / challenging Switzerland

This year Alt is playing its first competition (Alt NewCo), ten sessions. After the last session, every team that played in the NewCo can apply for playing in the Alt NewCo X-event, December 13-16, which will be the grand final of the competition.

Alt has the privilege to invite eight teams for group A, the rest of the teams for group B. Teams in group A will compete for two things: the winner of this group will be officially awarded with the title "winner of the Alt NewCo 2021".

Apart from this, numbers one and two will get an invitation to play the special one-day Alt X-hibition event on Friday, December 17 against the winner of the European Online Qualification for the Bermuda Bowl, Switzerland.

Number one of group B will also be awarded an invitation for playing the Alt X-hibition on Friday, December 17. It means that every single team that played in the Alt competition gets the chance to play the epilogue of the Alt season and actually the strongest field Alt has to offer.

Play on Friday will start at 20:00 CET/14:00 ET with a simple 3 x 8 boards single round-robin format. Alt will do its best to stream the Alt X-hibition with live Vugraph expert commentary. We look forward to this final week of the Alt season and are already preparing for 2022.

# Caviar to the General

Mark Horton

I hardly had time to blink on Monday - no sooner had the latest ALT contest got under way when Martin Cantor had already 'bagged' the first two deals of the day and I was still trying to get the cork out of the 1996 Dom Perignon. By the time I had had a chance to look at both matches and make a selection Martin, perhaps working on a bridge-themed version of *War & Peace* had already written those deals up too. Left with only crumbs to work with here are my offerings from the table of the lower ranks:

Round 1. Board 7. Dealer South. All Vul.

This is a slightly pushy game that probably needs a sensible trump split and a guess in diamonds. Without any clues from the bidding the natural play is to start with a low card to the ten, offering a 51% chance of scoring three tricks. Once West has opened the bidding you will be inclined to put the ♦K into that hand.

South's delayed entry into the auction was not enough to encourage North to make a try for game.

West led the ♥A and switched to the ♦K, declarer taking dummy's ace, drawing trumps ending in dummy and running the ♦9 (East had pitched a diamond on the spades). Two more diamonds saw a heart go from dummy and declarer then cashed the top clubs claiming eleven tricks, +200.

South's immediate introduction of spades was all the incentive North required. West cashed the top hearts and switched to the ♠4, declarer winning with dummy's queen and playing a diamond to the ten and king.

Declarer won the trump return with the king, played a diamond to the ace, cashed the ♠A and soon claimed ten tricks, +620 and 9 IMPs.

Declarer won with the king and cashed five hearts, but North took the last trick with the ♣K for -200.

West cashed the top hearts and switched to the ♣2, declarer taking dummy's ace, cashing the ace and king of spades and playing the ♦Q for the king and ace.

When declarer cashed the ♠Q, East, down to ♥Q ♦J75 ♣J93 was in trouble and pitched the ♥Q. That made declarer's ♥8 good, but declarer overlooked this vital point and went one down, -100.

West led a spade and declarer won in hand and ducked a heart, East winning and playing a second spade. Winning in dummy, declarer played a heart and West won and exited with a spade. Declarer won in dummy, cashed the ♦A and played a second diamond. When East followed with the five she put in the ten and now there were only nine tricks, +140, and 6 IMPs.

It was a strong defense by West. If he cashes a top heart and then leads a spade declarer can win and play a diamond to the ten and king. If West plays a second spade declarer wins and draws the outstanding trump, forcing East to pitch a heart. Declarer gives up a heart and will be able to ruff a heart in dummy, which will squeeze East in the minors.

NS are close to having the values for 3NT, but as long as the defenders are careful there should only be eight tricks. No one got close to 4♠ which can always be made as long as South is declarer (were North to be declarer a low diamond from East should be a killer).

South took a big position by passing 3♣. East led the ♦6 and declarer won with the queen, drew trumps and gave up a heart. When East switched to the ♠7 declarer took dummy's ace and West was subsequently squeezed in the spades and diamonds for +170. A second diamond would break up the squeeze - we'll come back to that later.

Detractors of the multi suggest that partner may have trouble working out which suit you have. That may be true in some situations, but common sense can be useful and here it was much more likely that East had hearts. West clicked on the ♥K and the defenders cashed out for -200 and 9 IMPs.

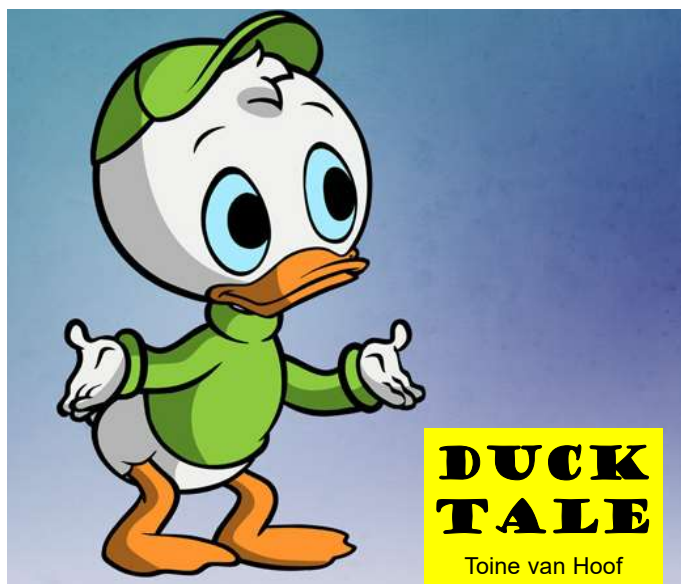

Wooldridge did well to remove 3NT. Subsequently he was the only declarer who found the winning play in 4♠. Just like at most other tables East led the ♣K. If declarer plays the ace, West ruffs and the defense is bound to get three more tricks. Wooldridge made the great play of ducking. East continued with the ♣Q, which Wooldridge also allowed to hold. If East switches, declarer takes the rest of the tricks. So he correctly played another club. West ruffed the ♣10 and played the ♦K to the ace. Wooldridge ruffed a club to hand, drew the trumps and claimed: plus 620.

In the replay NS ended up in 3NT (1♠-2♣; 2♠-2NT; 3NT). With no entry to the North hand this contract went three off, another plus 300 and 14 IMPs to team Edmonds.

Fine bidding brought Erengil in the excellent 5♣ contract. In spite of the bad trump split, she managed to make it. Erengil won the ♦K lead with the ace, cashed the ♥A, ruffed a heart in dummy and discarded two diamonds on the ace and king of spades. She ruffed a diamond in hand and another heart in dummy. Then she played the ♠Q. Perhaps East should have discarded, giving South the losing option of playing for the clubs to split no worse than three-one. When East ruffed with the king, Erengil overruffed, ruffed the ♥Q and played the ♠J. East was helpless. It made no sense to ruff so he discarded the ♦10. Declarer ruffed perforce and exited with the ♣10. East had only clubs left so South made the final trick with the ♣9.

I don't know about you, but when I sit down to play a tournament I'm not at all unhappy if the first board is something quiet and innocuous. It's a good job then that I was only commentating for the first match, as it started with a bang, at least for East-West.

Two almost solid suits. Thirty-one HCP. Every suit controlled. Opponents silent. Either black suit has twelve easy tricks. You'd think slam would be relatively commonplace. It wasn't to be. Three of eighteen pairs bid the spade slam, four bid the club slam. Eight pairs languished in game, and one played 6♦, off after a heart lead and continuation. I was watching Edmonds versus Fredin, and saw a pair of world champions bid like this:

There was no explanation of 3NT or 4♥, but Piotr Zatorski thought long and hard before his final pass, presumably thinking about pulling to either spades or notrump. That gave me the time to make the astute point to the several hundred kibitzers already gathered that passing or converting to notrump would likely fare better than 7♠, since all would depend on the opening lead. He chose to pass, Peter Fredin led the unexceptionable ♦9, and the play took mere moments. Hard to know whether to laugh or cry, whichever side you're on. One kibitzer asked me whether South might have doubled the 4♥ bid. On the one hand you don't know who will be on lead. On another hand you might not want to give away the position of the ace if the cue bid is of the king. And on the third hand, there is a remote possibility that EW also have a heart fit and you end up defending 4♥XX. So probably not. The excitement continued unabated:

On the bare facts this one is less promising. 'Only' 28 HCP, no semi-solid suit, wasted spade values (♠65432 would be just as good here). So only one strain makes, but the small slam is pretty good, especially if played by East (say on a Precision 1♣ opening) to protect the diamond tenace. Basically it needs clubs 2-2, or the diamond finesse, or some other small chances. What did the field do? Just three pairs bid 6♣. Twelve were in 3NT and one was in 5♣. One world-class pair had a misunderstanding and stopped in 3♣. And what did our world champions do?

Zatorski had another long think before his final call, and this time he decided to pull, presumably to protect that diamond holding. Gottlieb was never leading a spade into the strong notrump opening, but he didn't need to, this time there was nowhere to run, nowhere to hide, one down, and the score now stood at 10-11 (5♣ in the other room) when it could easily have been the other way round. After a two-board pause for breath this one popped up:

EW again. Down to a mere 26 HCP, enough for game they say. But East has a virtually solid suit and fabulous controls. Also, luckily, a perfect mesh in the club suit. Making the heart grand cold against anything except 5-0 clubs. You can also make twelve in either black suit, and I'm mildly surprised that only one pair played the 4-4 spade fit, but perhaps they all recall the maxim about not putting seven-card suits down in dummy. Did any or many reach the grand? Yes, just three: Pierre Bedout & Esteban Vallet of Rippey; Jaroslaw Cieslak & Dominik Filipowicz of OLCZYK; and Nedime de Taranto & Yasemin Erengil of The Magicians. Well done to all three. And our intrepid heroes? The rest all contracted for a small slam.

The opponents' interference was a hindrance, but might they have done better? For me the 6♥ bid tends to deny first-round diamond control, so no way for West to bid on. East's problem, however, is that if he bids the diamond control they may end up locked into spades, which will be just fine if West has the king (better still king fifth), but, as I said, solid seven-carders are for trumps. In any case, even if East pushes with a



diamond control, West doesn't have much to spare for his initial response, and the suit he has shown is poor, so will need a LOT of pushing to go beyond six. NS everywhere were very restrained with their twelve-card fit, doubtless owing to the vulnerability - had they bid higher, they might have pushed more East-West's higher. The match had one more slam hand to delight kibitzers and commentators alike.

Looking just at the NS hands you'd think everyone would be in a small slam, either notrump or diamonds (though North can also make clubs). The dealer has 18 balanced HCP, and responder has a balanced 14 with fabulous intermediates. They didn't all manage it, thanks to East. Just because you are vulnerable and only have 3 HCP is no reason to keep quiet, at least it wasn't for ten of our players, who jumped in with either a Michaels for the majors or a simple 1♠. It worked exactly half the time, with five interrupted NS pairs stopping in 3NT. Everyone else was in notrump (eight including both tables in my featured match) or diamond (five) slam. We didn't have too long to wait for the second match, and when we got there (for Black versus Lebowitz) we were straight into slam territory, indeed grand slam territory, once more.

Do you recognize the same key features? A more or less solid suit. Shape. All the controls. Now the grand isn't great, especially if, as is likely, it is played by West; on a diamond lead you either take the finesse (ugh at trick one), or go up with the ace which takes out an entry for setting up a long heart. I was again a bit surprised to see that only six pairs bid a slam (everyone was in spades of course). As West I have an almost solid suit, a four-loser hand, and my partner opens the bidding. I would need partner to apply the emergency brake to keep me out, but with extras and three-card support and three aces I'd expect my partner's foot to be on the accelerator. Ah, but there is a catch. East didn't deal, and at thirteen tables North, in line with the modern approach, opened, either 1♦ or some range of weak notrump. That makes it much tougher, so well done to the four EW pairs who overcame that obstacle to reach slam.

Just two pairs bid the grand, our friends from match 1 Piotr Zatorski and Michal Klukowski, and the table where I was watching, on this nice auction:

Another makeable grand, but needing you to choose between the diamond finesse (works), dropping the ♦Q in three (fails), or a red suit squeeze (works).

Unsurprisingly nobody contracted for all thirteen, but a little surprisingly only five contracted for twelve. But then, West's choice of action had a significant influence. The few who overcalled 4♣ were mostly well rewarded by keeping their opponents out. Overcalls at the two or three level were mostly less effective.

I wondered whether the Rimstedt twins might have bid the grand after this start to the auction:

Ola certainly has a club control, but what should he bid to confirm it? 6♠ would show second-round control in the suit, so 6♣ would presumably show first-round and give his brother the opportunity to show red suit things. Would 6♦ show first-round club and first- or second-round diamond control? That's what I thought he might choose. In the event he chose 6♥, I guess offering an alternative contract. Mikael put him back to spades and there it rested, with the full auction below. Mind you, failing to bid the not-so-good grand didn't cost much; their opponents were only in game, so they gained 13 IMPs not 17.

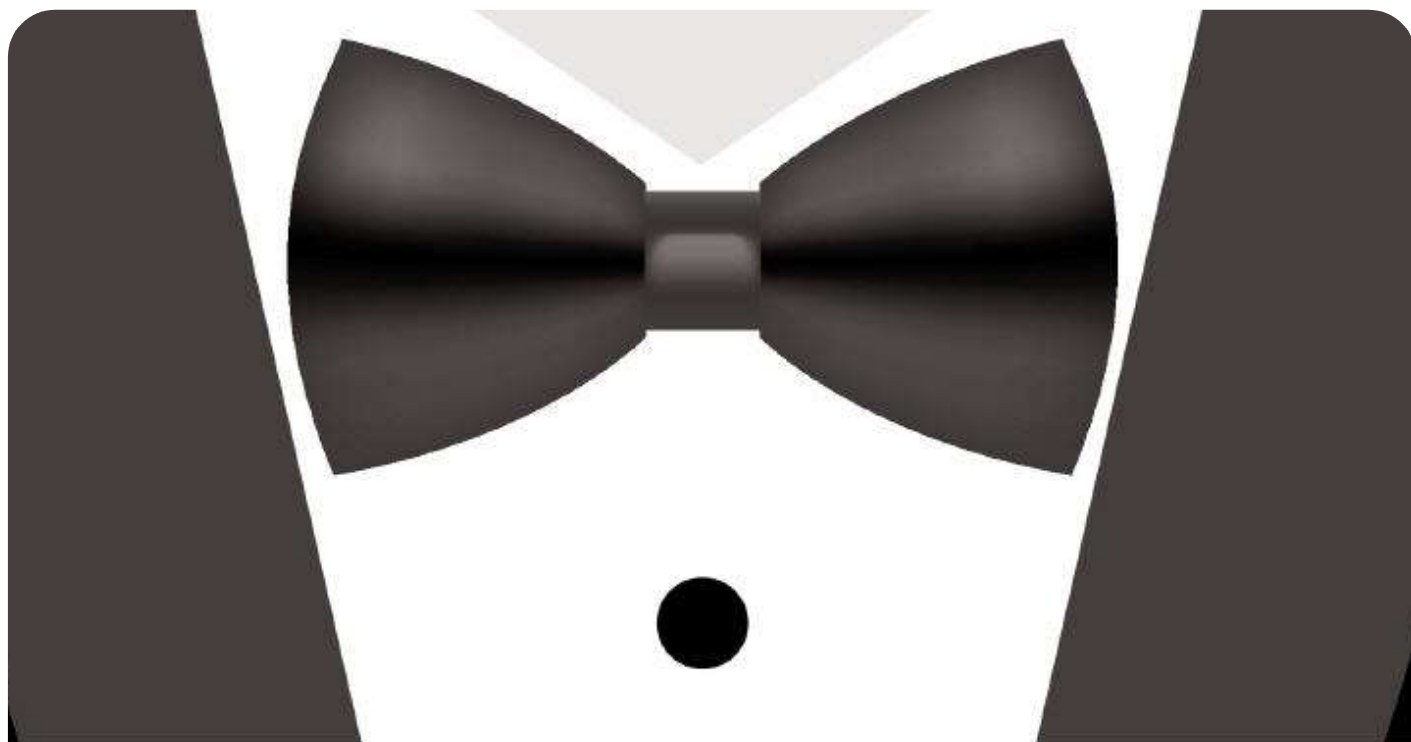

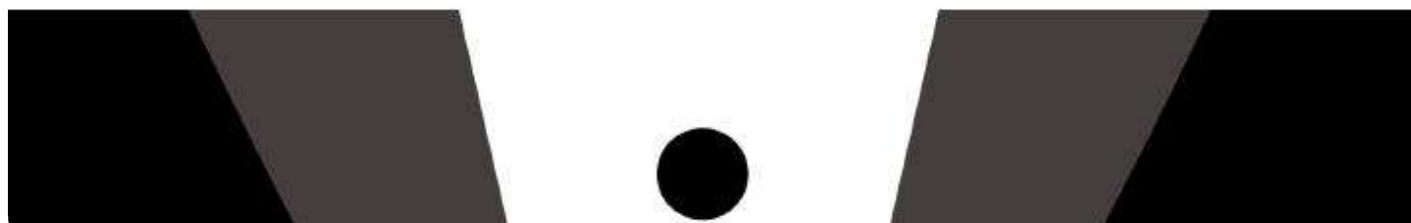
On the ♥10 East pitched the ♠2, South the ♦9 and West the ♦J. On the ♥9 East discarded the ♦4 and South the ♦Q, while West had to give up the ♠10. Maruša unerringly played a spade to the ace, dropping the queen. The ♠J took the last trick for a magnificent plus 2140 and a gain of 19 IMPs (at the other table South went down in 6NT).

Maruša made the following comment on her play: "I didn't want to commit to a certain line (finesse) immediately and was trying to test all my chances. This is why I played a trump on trick 3 to see if trumps are 3-2 or 4-1 (if 4-1 I thought I needed hearts 3-3). When I saw trumps were 3-2 I ruffed a heart and now in case hearts were 3-3 I was home. When that didn't work I had to decide which finesse to take. I was just going to take the spade finesse and cashed the ace of diamonds first because I thought that might give me some squeeze possibilities. After West discarded the 10 of spades and the jack of diamonds I changed my mind and I thought the squeeze was working. Don't make me sound like some mastermind though, I could have easily gone down in a laydown as it usually happens :)"

Modesty is not in place here. Maruša Gold played the hand absolutely brilliantly and is hereby nominated for the *BeBridge Best Played Alt Hand*.

## Misguided Brilliancy - Part 2

What is going on? You can take three more spade tricks and if your partner has the ♦A the contract is down. Why isn't declarer cashing his club tricks? Surely partner had king-second as he would not have covered with a third club. So declarer is marked with ace-third. Wait! He must be missing the 2. The clubs are blocked and this sly old fox tries to lure you into playing spades so he can get rid of his blocking club. Is there a way to prevent that?



Bartosz Chmurski

Bartosz Chmurski who got this defensive problem, found a brilliant solution: he shot back the ♣10, removing the entry before declarer could unblock. With the club suit buried, the contract was bound to fail. However, the upshot was not what Chmurski wished for. This was the lay-out:

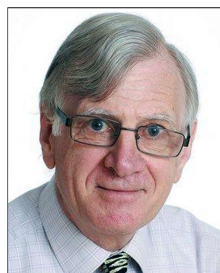

South and not West happened to have the ♦A, so the defense could have cashed out for down one. After the club return declarer still had only eight tricks but when he played a diamond from dummy, South ducked the ace and saw declarer claim.

Chmurski put the blame on himself: "Unfortunately I miscounted declarer's tricks: one spade, four hearts, one diamond (if he has the ace) and two clubs, not three. I know this kind of play from bridge books and never had it in a real game. I was so happy about the occasion to execute such a defense that I didn't count declarer's tricks exactly."



David Kendrick

The sly old fox who declared the hand was David Kendrick. Why didn't he try a diamond from hand after winning the ♣A? "I didn't think a diamond would get past LHO's ace, and RHO would win it anyway. A spade seemed the best shot. I thought that there was a reasonable chance that my LHO wouldn't cash his spades. If that is what declarer seems to want you

to do, maybe best to do something else."

At the other table declarer went for the legitimate chance of dropping the bare ♣K: down two and 11 IMPs to The Seniors.
